### Program Overview:

During the first four weeks (June 14-July 10), we will cover all college-level Latin grammar and syntax in order to prepare you to read continuous prose and poetry from classical authors in the second four weeks (July 12-August 6). The pace will be rapid: we will cover roughly one unit in the grammar textbook per day, i.e. a week's worth of material. At least at first, most of your free time will be spent memorizing forms, which must be learned perfectly.

On Monday, June 14, those who wish to participate in the optional Grammar Review session (especially for those who have had no Latin or who need to review key terms such as direct object, active voice, and intransitive verb) will meet in the Classics Conference Room in the basement of Cocks Hall at 10:30 am. The entire class will meet in Cocks 101 at 1:30 pm for the first mandatory session.

For the regular morning sessions, the class will meet with Harold Reeves in Cocks 101. Each morning session will begin at 9:30 am with discussion of the assigned homework sentences and additional grammatical drills and exercises. In the last fifteen minutes of class, there will be a short quiz covering the material up to and including the unit presented on the previous day. These quizzes will have questions on vocabulary, forms, syntax, and translation.

The afternoon sessions will be mostly lecture, based on Moreland & Fleischer, in which Tom Garvey will introduce new material. Any time that remains will be spent on drills or sight-reading. In preparation for each afternoon's lecture, it is important that you preview each new unit in advance.

In the evening, Jennifer LaFleur will hold an Evening Session from 5 to 6:30 pm, and then office hours from 6:30 to 8. The evening session is required for students that scored below an A- on the day's quiz, but it is recommended that all attend for the first week.
