ART HISTORY AND HISTORY OF ARCHITECTURE

ARTH 274 Arts of the Himalayas

1300-1515 MTWRF Pakhoutova Lecture 3 credits

This course will introduce students to the Buddhist art and architecture of the Himalayas (northern India, Nepal, Tibet). We will look at the variety of artistic expressions produced in these areas and consider them in the context of cultural and socio-political processes in the region. We will also explore the topics of Buddhist iconography, ritual and production of art; learn about styles and methods of typically Himalayan painting and sculpture. A field trip to the Virginia Museum of Art in Richmond, or the Freer and Sackler Galleries in Washington D.C. will also be part of the course.

Notes: Assigned readings, active participation in class, 2 quizzes, midterm, and final.

CHIN 101S Elementary Chinese

CHIN 101 is a beginning-level course in Modern Standard Mandarin Chinese for students with little or no prior experience in the language. This course is not intended for native and near-native speakers of Chinese. The course provides students with systematic training in listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills on a daily basis.
