

## **Overview**

The Department of East Asian Languages, Literatures and Cultures offers an undergraduate degree program for students who want to achieve proficiency in the languages of China, Japan, Korea and Tibet, as well as a deeper understanding of their literatures and cultures. Our program includes undergraduate courses in classical and modern literatures for most of the languages. We also offer courses that teach these literatures in English translation and that emphasize their relevance to the sociopolitical, historical, and cultural aspects of East Asia.

Students interested in studying East Asia are encouraged to begin their language training as soon as possible, preferably in their first semester at UVa. All DEAL-LC language programs offer the introductory 101-level course each Fall (no DEAL-LC language programs offer 101-level courses in the spring semesters).

Students interested in declaring either of DEAL-LC's majors must take our introductory non-language course: EAST 101 (East Asian Canons and Cultures).

Both of DEAL-LC's majors are interdisciplinary, so courses from other departments are required. See the departmental website for more information and for a complete list of requirements for the two majors and the minor.

## **MAJOR REQUIREMENTS WORKSHEETS**

### **Major Requirement Worksheet for East Asian Languages and Literatures Major With a Concentration in Chinese**

#### **Prerequisites:**

- 202 level of Chinese language. A grade of C+ or higher must be earned in each semester.
- EAST 101 with a grade of C or higher.

#### **Requirements:**

- 30 credits in DEAL-LC and related courses, of which

- 18 credits must be in Chinese language beyond the 202 or 206 level. At the discretion of the student's advisor, 6 of these credits may be from a second language in the same region at the 100 level or higher.
  - 6 additional credits must be DEAL-LC courses
  - 6 credits must be in regional concentration course from the following areas: Anthropology, Art History, DEAL-LC, History, Politics, Religious Studies, and Studies in Women and Gender (see the DEAL-LC Web site for current listing).
- A maximum of 15 study abroad credits and domestic transfer credits are allowed at the discretion of the student's advisor.

### DECLARING A MAJOR

1. Select a DEAL-LC language or languages. The only options currently for the single language major are Chinese and Japanese. If you wish to try the two-language option, then decide on what will be your first language and consult with the advisor for that language.
2. Review course listings by area and the major requirements sheet by language. You may download the Major Requirements Worksheet from the departmental website (under "Degree Programs") or obtain one from the bulletin boards in the hallway of the basement of Cabell Hall.
3. Obtain the following two forms: the Department of East Asian Languages, Literatures and Cultures Declaration of Major Advising Form and Declaration of Major for the B.A.

or B.S. Degree form from The College of Arts and Sciences. You may download the departmental Declaration of Major Advising Form from the departmental website (under “Degree Programs: Forms”). The College of Arts and Sciences Declaration of Major Form can be found in Garrett Hall. All forms are also available in B027 Cabell Hall.

4. Complete the top portion of the Declaration of Major Advising Form and the A&S Declaration of Major form.
5. Make an appointment with the undergraduate advisor. (See below for a list of advisors)
6. Bring the following items to your meeting with the advisor: Major Requirements Worksheet, DEAL-LC Declaration of Major Advising Form, and College of Arts and Sciences Declaration of Major form.
7. Submit all forms and copies to the appropriate parties (as indicated on the bottom of the forms).
