A About the speaker:

Farzaneh Milani is Associate Professor of Persian and Studies in Women and Gender at the University of Virginia. Born and raised in Iran, Milani received her B.A. in French Literature from California State University at Hayward and completed her graduate studies in Comparative Literature at the University of California in Los Angeles. She taught Persian Language and Literature at UCLA for four years before coming to the University of Virginia in 1986. Past president of the Association of Middle Eastern Women Studies in America, Milani was the recipient of Alumni Teaching Award in 1998.

She is the author of "Veils and Words: The Emerging Voices of Iranian Women Writers" (chosen as one of the "12 most indispensable books written in English about Iran in the last twenty years"); guest editor of two special issues of "Nimeye Digar," and co-translator (with Kaveh Safa) of "A Cup of Sin: Selected Poems of Simin Behbahani." Milani has written over 60 articles, book chapters, introductions, and afterwards in Persian and English and lectured at over 100 colleges and universities nationally and internationally. Her poems have been published in "Nimeye Digar," "Par," "Barrayand," "Daneshju," "Omid," and "Avaye Portland."
