About the speaker:

In the fall of 1994, William B. Quandt joined the Department of Government and Foreign Affairs at the University of Virginia, where he holds the Edward R. Stettinius chair and currently serves as Vice Provost for International Affairs. He teaches courses on the Middle East and American Foreign Policy. Prior to this appointment, he was a Senior Fellow in the Foreign Policy Studies Program at the Brookings Institution, where he conducted research on the Middle East, American policy toward the Arab-Israeli conflict, and energy policy.

Mr. Quandt received his BA in International Relations from Stanford University in 1963, and his Ph.D. in Political Science from MIT in 1968. Before going to Brookings in 1979, Dr. Quandt served as a staff member on the National Security Council (1972-1974, 1977-1979). He was actively involved in the negotiations that led to the Camp David Accords and the Egyptian-Israeli Peace Treaty. He was also an Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Pennsylvania, worked at the Rand Corporation in the Department of Social Science from 1968-1972, and taught at UCLA and MIT.

Mr. Quandt has written numerous books, and his articles have appeared in a wide variety of publications. His books include: *Peace Process: American Diplomacy and the Arab-Israeli Conflict Since 1967*, (Brookings, 2001, revised edition; 1993); *Between Ballots and Bullets: Algeria's Transition from Authoritarianism*, (Brookings, 1998); *The United States and Egypt: An Essay on Policy for the 1990s*, (Brookings, 1990); *Camp David: Peacemaking and Politics*, (Brookings, 1986); *Saudi Arabia in the 1980s: Foreign Policy, Security, and Oil*, (Brookings, 1981); *Decade of Decisions: American Foreign Policy Toward the Arab-Israeli Conflict, 1967-1976*, (University of California Press, 1977); and *Revolution and Political Leadership: Algeria, 1954-1968*, (MIT Press, 1969). He also edited *The Middle East: Ten Years After Camp David*, (Brookings, 1988).
