Virginia's food system is a broad, dynamic enterprise. Developments in the food system are driven by consumers, industry, agribusiness, small farms, universities, regulatory agencies, and local government. The sustainability of the food system will depend on the ability of these groups to help define decisions made today that will certainly affect tomorrow's opportunities.

This Summit has been developed to offer the opportunity for individuals from diverse food system backgrounds to openly discuss issues affecting the sustainability of Virginia's food system. Summit participants will have the opportunity to discuss food, nutrition, health, medicine, policy, and environmental trends that will shape the future food system.
